## GRACE ABOUNDING TO THE CHIEF OF SINNERS from 1 TIMOTHY 1:12-17

When Paul discusses the Lord's Supper in 1 Cor 11, he says, "the Lord Jesus on the same night in which He was betrayed took bread; and when He had given thanks, He broke it." A traditional Christian name for the Lord's Supper is the Eucharist. The word Eucharist means "thanksgiving" and comes from that phrase in verse 24, when he had given thanks. When we come to the Lord's Table, we ought to have a heart of thanksgiving to God for all that he has done for us.

In 1 Tim 1, Paul is amazed at the privilege he has been given to be Christ's minister. So in verse

12 he "thanks Christ Jesus our Lord." Why should we give thanks this morning? Paul gives us four reasons to thank our God:	
1.	We give thanks because Jesus saves blaspheming infidels (vv12-13).
2.	We give thanks because Jesus abounds with grace (vv14-15).
3.	We give thanks because Jesus comforts us with his grace (v16).
4.	We give thanks because our God is glorious (v17).
